1.6 The organ of state reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a tender is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the organ of state.

## 2. DEFINITIONS

- (a) **“tender”** means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation to provide goods or services through price quotations, competitive tendering process or any other method envisaged in legislation;
- (b) **“price”** means an amount of money tendered for goods or services, and includes all applicable taxes less all unconditional discounts;
- (c) **“rand value”** means the total estimated value of a contract in Rand, calculated at the time of bid invitation, and includes all applicable taxes;
- (d) **“tender for income-generating contracts”** means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation for the origination of income-generating contracts through any method envisaged in legislation that will result in a legal agreement between the organ of state and a third party that produces revenue for the organ of state, and includes, but is not limited to, leasing and disposal of assets and concession contracts, excluding direct sales and disposal of assets through public auctions; and
- (e) **“the Act”** means the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act, 2000 (Act No. 5 of 2000).

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## **1. PURPOSE**

- 1.1 The services of a service provider is required to undertake the Feasibility Study and Business Case Report (including a Theory of Change) for the establishment of the proposed Climate Change Response Fund (CCRF) for a period of 06 months.
- 1.2 The outcome of the proposed work must include an assessment of the proposed CCRF which is inclusive of the following: substantiate value addition, avoidance of duplication to other existing or new and emerging facilities within the public sector, and provide recommendations which are realistic, practical and supportive of responding to climate change.

## **2. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND**

- 2.1 South Africa is increasingly experiencing the severe impacts of climate change, including prolonged droughts, extreme heatwaves, destructive floods, and wildfires, all of which threaten human health, ecosystems, infrastructure, livelihoods, and economic stability. The country's limited adaptive capacity, fragmented financing mechanisms, and overreliance on public sector disaster relief funding has left it highly vulnerable to climate shocks.
- 2.2 These findings are further corroborated by the conclusions of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) 2022, report which indicated that South Africa's natural disasters were likely to increase in severity and frequency given the likely increase in temperature due to climate change even after implementation of risk reduction activities (IPCC, 2022).
- 2.3 To address the persistent effects of global warming which manifests as persistent floods, fires and droughts, President Ramaphosa announced the establishment of a Climate Change Response Fund (CCRF) at the 2024 State of the Nation Address, that will bring together all spheres of government and the private sector. By coordinating financial mobilisation from both government and the private sector through the Fund, South Africa will be able to leverage on collaborative efforts to build resilience and respond more effectively to climate change.

- 2.4 The proposed CCRF is intended to further address adaptation financing gaps, facilitate the enhancement of financing for mitigation and catalyse investment into resilience-building initiatives. Furthermore the proposed CCRF should contribute towards the development of a financing mechanism as proposed in the Climate Change Act (Act 22 of 2024), Chapter 3 Section 18 which reads: “*The Minister must prescribe a mechanism to support and finance the Republic’s climate change response, planning and implementation by national, provincial and local government in consultation with the Minister of Finance*”.
- 2.5 During 2024, the Presidential Climate Commission undertook stakeholder engagement sessions which culminated in a *Stakeholder Perspectives Report on a Climate Change Response Fund for South Africa* and a *Climate Change Response Fund Recommendation Report*. These documents provide initial recommendations and proposed modalities for the establishment and operation of the proposed CCRF.
- 2.6 Furthermore, the Feasibility Study for the CCRF should take into consideration the following:
- South Africa’s National Adaptation Strategy.
  - South Africa’s Low Emissions Development Strategy (LEDS).
  - The latest version of South Africa’s Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC).
  - Obligations arising from the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Paris Agreement, particularly those related to climate finance.
- 2.7 The intention of the proposed CCRF is to align with existing climate finance initiatives, including the Just Transition Funding Mechanism (JTFM), the Just Energy Transition Investment Plan (JET-IP), and disaster risk financing. The CCRF is not intended to replace existing disaster relief mechanisms. Rather, it is envisaged as a strategic adaptation and resilience finance mechanism, which should also have the capacity for mitigation financing as well as clearly defined and limited post-extreme weather event support that complements existing disaster risk management arrangements.
- 2.8 The proposed CCRF may not adequately address all aspects of climate change adaptive capacity, due to the extent of the climate-related impacts that South Africa faces. For this reason, it is recommended that the proposed CCRF focuses on interventions (irrespective of region, sector or stakeholder group) which build resilience to reduce the risk of climate disasters and mitigate against the effects of climate change, whilst facilitating and/or catalysing investment into improving the response of existing mechanisms.

- 2.9 It is not the intention of the proposed CCRF to duplicate efforts related to climate finance mechanisms, but to enhance and provide post-extreme weather event support, whilst harnessing opportunities for accessing climate finance and to promote the coordination of local climate response efforts.
- 2.10 It is recommended that the proposed CCRF applies a phased approach to enhancing climate resilience, with a focus on initiatives related to futureproofing and building-back-better, through targeting adaptation finance towards enhancing anticipatory capacity, safeguarding communities and ecosystems, and accelerating disaster preparedness and recovery. Furthermore, the CCRF should also address issues related to enhancing financing for mitigation.
- 2.11 The proposed CCRF's strategic objectives are:
- Enhancing climate resilience across sectors and levels.
  - Strengthening early warning and disaster management systems.
  - Enhancing financing for both adaptation and mitigation from both the public and private sector including from domestic and international sources.
  - Promoting innovation and capacity development.
  - Engaging the private sector in climate financing.
- 2.12 The proposed CCRF aims to deliver on this goal through three primary outcome areas:
- a) **Strengthening Climate Risk Preparedness and Anticipatory Capacity** by improving early warning systems, climate risk forecasting, and institutional readiness to mitigate climate-related disasters.
  - b) **Enhancing Climate Resilience Across Ecosystems, Infrastructure, and Livelihoods** by supporting ecosystem-based adaptation, climate-smart agriculture, and resilient infrastructure development, ensuring that investments protect both natural and built environments.
  - c) **Strengthening Disaster Response and Recovery Systems** by improving disaster response mechanisms, emergency planning, and post-disaster recovery capacity, ensuring faster recovery and better resilience against climate-induced shocks.

- 2.13 A Feasibility Study and Business Case Report on the proposed CCRF will provide the required guidance to determine the most legally appropriate institutional mechanism to address the objectives as detailed above. It should be noted that the establishment of such a fund remains subject to various factors which are inclusive of applicable legislation, fiscal approvals and Cabinet processes.

### 3. OBJECTIVES

- 3.1. The objective is to appoint a suitable service provider to undertake the Feasibility Study and Business Case (including a Theory of Change) for the establishment and operation of the proposed Climate Change Response Fund (CCRF). The literature review must be inclusive of the following key documents: *Stakeholder Perspectives on a Climate Change Response Fund for South Africa*<sup>1</sup> and the *Climate Change Response Fund Recommendations Report*<sup>2</sup> which was published by the Presidential Climate Commission in 2024.
- 3.2 The proposed CCRF must be inclusive key steps/interventions for operation in the short, medium and long term. This must be informed through a Theory of Change which guides envisaged impacts in the medium to long term.

### 4 SCOPE AND EXTENT OF WORK

#### 4.1 The following services will be required from the Service Provider

##### 4.1.1 *Feasibility Study and Business Case Report (including a Theory of Change):*

The appointed Service Provider will be required to undertake an independent review of the *Climate Change Response Fund Recommendations Report* developed by the Presidential Climate Commission and other early-stage baseline documentation. Results from this review will be presented in the form of a Feasibility Study which will address the following aspects/recommendations:

- Potential duplications/overlaps of existing Funds/initiatives with the proposed CCRF.

- A statutory overlap analysis including an analysis of constitutional functional competencies between national, provincial and local government.
- Separation of functions and promotion of synergies: short medium and long term.
- Legal compatibility with the National Treasury framework.
- Whether legislation or regulations would be required to establish the CCRF.
- Assessment of implications under the:
  - Public Finance Management Act (PFMA);
  - Treasury Regulations;
  - Division of Revenue Act (DORA) – where Municipalities may benefit.
- An analysis of options, including whether the CCRF should be established as:
  - a public entity or a facility within an existing government owned Development Finance Institution (DFI);
  - a Special Purpose Vehicle;
  - a facility within the Private Sector;
  - a “Fund of Funds”;
  - an Umbrella Fund;
  - a Trust;
  - a programme within DFFE or the National Treasury; or
  - another legal structure.
- Governance and fiduciary risk analysis.

The outcomes of the Feasibility Study must inform the Business Case Report (BCR) (inclusive of the Theory of Change). In addition to the Feasibility Study the Business Case Report must also be guided by input from stakeholders. The BCR must comprehensively address the following:

- CCRF conceptualisation and design options.
- Need for seed funding, first loss funding.
- Ability of the CCRF to progressively take on a loan focus as well as grants.
- Ability of the CCRF to be independent of fiscal support beyond the initial fiscal financing period, sources for crowding in additional finance from donors/investors in sustaining the CCRF in the medium to long term.
- Defining the objectives and parameters of the CCRF and supporting governance structures to inform functionality of the CCRF, propose modality for operation and location of the CCRF.
- A comprehensive Theory of Change for the establishment of the proposed CCRF, which should identify:

- legislative amendments required;
- regulatory approvals required;
- intergovernmental coordination requirements; and
- governance accountability mechanisms.

4.1.2 *On aspects related to the design and establishment processes of the CCRF the BCR (including the Theory of Change) must reflect on:*

- Institutional arrangements and modalities.
- Funding modalities should be inclusive of:
  - transparent funding allocation criteria;
  - administrative justice compliance under Promotion of Administrative Justice Act, 2000 (“PAJA”);
  - appeal/review mechanisms;
  - beneficiary grievance procedures; and
  - anti-fraud controls.
- Governance structure proposals.
- Establishment of an operating structure (including standard agreements, governing processes and systems).
- Design and Planning of Funding Windows.
- Monitoring & Evaluation Framework in relation to the CCRF mandate.

4.1.3 *On aspects related to the Implementation modalities of the CCRF the BCR (including the Theory of Change) must reflect on:*

- Application procedures and guidelines.
- Financial instruments and eligibility criteria.
- Evaluation and review process.
- Approval process.
- Disbursement process and targets.

4.1.4 *The BCR (including the Theory of Change) must also include an assessment of CCRF impact against objectives:*

- Indicative development impact of the Fund through the assessment of:

- whether the measurement parameters (unit of measure) are appropriate for the intent of the indicators?
- whether the project-level reporting indicators are appropriately aligned with the respective portfolio level indicators, measurement parameters and assumptions?
- whether project level reporting indicators (on both current and potential impact) are logically reasonable and are based on clear boundaries, assumptions and appropriate units?
- Role of the CCRF in responding to climate change impacts in the short, medium and long term and assessment of leveraging additional financial resources.

#### 4.1.5 Verification of impact indicators:

- Critical review of the method and assumptions related to each of the impact indicators used to measure the “current” and “potential” scale of impact as indicated in the CCRF Mandate.

All deliverables must be completed within 06 months from the appointment date. An indicative timeframe for delivery of services is provided in Table 1.

**9.4. PHASE 3: PRICE AND PREFERENCE POINTS (BELOW 50 MILLION)**

9.4.1 The preference point system applicable for this bid is 80/20.

9.4.2 The following preference point system will be followed to advance the categories of persons:

- a. For contracts with a Rand value up to R50 000 000, a maximum of 20 points may be allocated for specific goals as contemplated above, provided that the lowest acceptable tender scores 80 points for price.

- i. The applicable formula to be used is  $P_s=80[1-(P_t-P_{min})/P_{min}]$ . Provided:

## 10. BID SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- 10.1.5. Project reference specifying the role played by the service provider in the listed projects or assignments.
- 10.1.6. A detailed project plan with clear indication of who will be responsible for the management of the assignment as well as its execution. The allocation of team members on the assignments must be based on the experience in delivering the scope of work as listed.
- 10.1.7. Standard bidding documents (SBD1, 3.3, 4 and 6.1).
- 10.1.8. Copy of Central Supplier Database (CSD) report or tax pin certificate from SARS.
- 10.1.9. Letter of Authority to sign documents on behalf of the company.
- 10.1.10. DFFE reserves the right to seek clarity, request additional information and verify documents submitted by bidders. Bidders who fail to provide the requested information within the prescribed time may be disqualified and will not be evaluated further or forfeit points

## **11. LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK OF THE BID**

### **11.1. Tax Legislation**

- 11.1.1 Bidder must at all-time be compliant when submitting a proposal to DFFE and remain compliant for the entire contract term with all applicable tax legislation, including but not limited to the Income Tax Act, 1962 (Act No. 58 of 1962) and Value Added Tax Act, 1991 (Act No. 89 of 1991).

The sworn affidavit must be signed by the deponent (Bidder), in the presence of a Commissioner of Oaths where the Commissioner of Oaths must affix his/her signature, together with the stamp of the office, and affix a date on which the signature was affixed. Furthermore, the dates of the deponent and the CoO must correspond.
- 11.2.3 If the application is made by a Joint Venture or Partnership, the B-BBEE accreditation credentials in the name of joined entities must be submitted. Bidders are required to submit a consolidated B-BBEE certificate, issued by a SANAS-accredited service provider, to verify their collective B-BBEE status. The joint venture must meet the requirements of the proposal
- 11.3. Privacy and Protection of Personal Information Act 4 of 2013
- 11.3.1 Protecting personal information is important to the Department of Forestry, Fisheries, and the Environment. To do so, DFFE follows general principles by applicable privacy laws and the Protection of Personal Information Act 4 of 2013 (POPIA).
- 11.3.2 DFFE's role as the responsible party is amongst others to process personal information for the intended purpose for which it was obtained and in line with legal agreements with its respective/ prospective service providers and third parties.
- 11.3.3 DFFE will process personal information only with the knowledge and authorisation of the bidder/ respondent and will treat the personal information which comes to its knowledge as confidential and will not disclose it unless so required by law or subject to the exception contained in the POPIA.
- 11.3.4 DFFE reserves all the rights afforded to it by the POPIA in the processing of any of its information as contained in this bid and the bidder/respondent is required to comply with all prescripts as detailed in the POPIA relating to all information concerning DFFE.
- 11.3.5 In responding to this bid, DFFE acknowledges that it will obtain and have access to the personal information of the bidder/ respondent. DFFE agrees that it shall only process the information disclosed by the bidder/ respondent in their response to this bid for evaluation and subsequent award of the tender and by any applicable law.

## 12. SPECIAL CONDITIONS OF THE CONTRACT

- 12.1. On appointment, the performance measures for the delivery of the project will be closely monitored by the DFFE.
- 12.2. Task team meetings will be aligned to **Table 1** and final agreed upon workplan. The service provider will be required to submit monthly progress reports for the duration of the project. Failure to submit the required reports on time will result in penalties as outlined in the Memorandum of Agreement.
- 12.3. The Project Manager shall do the ongoing management of the Service Level Agreement.
- 12.4. Appointed service providers may be subjected to security vetting and screening.
- 12.5. The service provider/s must guarantee the presence of the senior in charge of fieldwork throughout the duration of the contract.
- 12.6. Before the appointment of a replacement, the DFFE Project Manager must approve such appointment. If the senior must leave the project, a period of at least one (01) month is required, in which the senior must work parallel with the next person (senior consultant with similar expertise and equal years of experience) appointed and able to transfer skills and knowledge.
- 12.7. All the conditions specified in the **General Conditions of Contract (GCC)** will apply and where the conditions in the special conditions of contract, which may not conflict with applicable law, contradict the conditions in the general conditions of contract the special conditions of contract will prevail.
- 12.8. The service provider shall notify the DFFE in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contract if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the service provider from any liability or obligation under the contract.
- 12.9. The proposals should be submitted with all required information containing technical information.
- 12.10. DFFE reserves the right to reject proposals that are not submitted in the prescribed format or where information presented is illegible or incomplete and will not be evaluated further, this will be undertaken through procedural fairness with and considering *audit alteram partem* principles including PAJA compliance.
- 12.11. DFFE reserves the right to seek clarity, request additional information and verify documents submitted by bidders. Bidders who fail to provide the requested information within the prescribed may be disqualified and will not be evaluated further or forfeit points
- 12.12. A trust, consortium, or joint venture will qualify for Preference Points if their consolidated BBBEE certificate combined ownership is more than 50% (fifty percent) of ownership on specific goals (e.g., two or more companies claiming preference points). Bidders will forfeit the preference points for non-submission combined BBBEE certificates
- 12.13. DFFE reserves the right to request additional information to validate any information submitted by bidders including preference points claimed. Bidders who fail to provide the requested information within

the prescribed timeframe will forfeit the preference points or excluded from the finalisation of the procurement process.

- 12.14. If the DFFE is of the view that a Bidder submitted false information regarding a Specific Goal, the DFFE must inform the Bidder accordingly and allow the Bidder to make representations within 14 (fourteen) days as to why: -
  - 12.14.1. the Tender may not be disqualified, or,
  - 12.14.2 if the Tender has already been awarded to the Bidder, why the contract should not be terminated.
- 12.15 After considering the representations, the DFFE may, if it concludes that the information relating to a Specific Goal is false, disqualify the Bidder or terminate the Contract in whole or in part and if applicable, claim damages from the Bidder, subject to applicable procurement legislation and principles of fairness, equity, transparency, competitiveness and cost-effectiveness.
- 12.16 Poor or non-performance by the bidder will result in the cancellation of contracts.
- 12.17 Please take note that DFFE is not bound to select any of the firms submitting proposals. DFFE reserves the right not to award any of the bids and not to award the contract to the lowest bidding price.
- 12.18 DFFE will not be held responsible for any costs incurred by the service providers in the preparation, presentation, and submission of the proposal.
- 12.19 The Department will consider Company and Individual(s) (Personnel) experience and Qualifications obtained within and outside the Republic of South Africa (RSA). For evaluation purposes, qualifications obtained outside RSA must be accompanied by the SAQA Certificate of Evaluation (SCoE). The SCoE must indicate the recognition decision taken by SAQA concerning the foreign qualification and the comparability of that qualification with a South African qualification registered on the National Qualification Framework (NQF). Foreign qualifications that are not accompanied by the SCoE will not be considered for evaluation in this contract.
- 12.20 The recognition of foreign qualifications is in terms of the South African National Qualifications Framework (NQF) conducted by SAQA. SAQA derives this mandate from the NQF Act, 67 of 2008 (as amended) and performs the function according to the Policy and Criteria for Evaluating Foreign Qualifications within the South African NQF (as amended, 2017). If the invoice together with the supporting evidence and/or report is approved, the Department shall make a direct payment to the Service Provider within the remaining 23 (twenty-three) calendar days of approval of such invoice and/or report, thus ensuring that payment of invoice is made within the 30 (thirty) calendar days timeframe.

**NOTES**

The purpose of this document is to:

- (i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
- (ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

## TABLE OF CLAUSES

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## General Conditions of Contract

### 1. Definitions

1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
  - 1.1 “Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
  - 1.2 “Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
  - 1.3 “Contract price” means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
  - 1.4 “Corrupt practice” means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
  - 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
  - 1.6 “Country of origin” means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
  - 1.7 “Day” means calendar day.
  - 1.8 “Delivery” means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
  - 1.9 “Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
  - 1.10 “Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
  - 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the

RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such

obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

## **2. Application**

2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.

2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.

2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

## **3. General**

3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.

3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from [www.treasury.gov.za](http://www.treasury.gov.za)

## **4. Standards**

4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

## **5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.**

5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.

5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.

5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier’s performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.

5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier’s records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

## **6. Patent rights**

6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

**7. Performance security**

- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
- (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
  - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

**8. Inspections, tests and analyses**

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or

analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

**9. Packing**

9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.

9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

**10. Delivery and documents**

10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.

10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

**11. Insurance**

11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

**12. Transportation**

12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

**13. Incidental services**

13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:

- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
- (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
- (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;

- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

**14. Spare parts**

14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
- (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
  - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
  - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

**15. Warranty**

15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take

such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

- 16. Payment**
- 16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.
- 17. Prices**
- 17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.
- 18. Contract amendments**
- 18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.
- 19. Assignment**
- 19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.
- 20. Subcontracts**
- 20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.
- 21. Delays in the supplier's performance**
- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the

supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.

21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.

21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

## **22. Penalties**

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

## **23. Termination for default**

23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any

person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

**24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights**

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which

may be due to him

**25. Force Majeure**

- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

**26. Termination for insolvency**

- 26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

**27. Settlement of Disputes**

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
  - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

**28. Limitation of liability**

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

- (b) aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.
- 29. Governing language** 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.
- 30. Applicable law** 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.
- 31. Notices** 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice
- 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.
- 32. Taxes and duties** 32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.
- 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.
- 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.
- 33. National Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme** 33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.
- 34 Prohibition of Restrictive practices** 34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).
- 34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

- 34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
